Lesson Plan Title: Adopting Copernicus

Discipline / Subject: English/Language Arts

Topic: Story Elements

Grade Level: Kindergarten, 1st grade

Resources / References / Materials Teacher Needs: Copy of "Adopting Copernicus" story, worksheet

Lesson Summary: Use the story to lead into a lesson on finding the beginning, middle, and end of a story

Standards Addressed: (Local, State, or National)

1. CCSS.ELA-Literacy.RL.K1.K2, K7

With prompting and support, ask and answer questions about key details in a text. With prompting and support, retell familiar stories, including key details.

With prompting and support, describe the relationship between illustrations and the story in which they appear (e.g., what moment in a story an illustration depicts).

Learning objectives:

- 1. The student will be able to retell and draw the beginning, middle, and end of the story
- 2. The student will be able to describe the illustrations and explain what was happening in each according to the story.

Assessment:

Student oral retelling of the story and the story element worksheet – did the student comprehend the meaning of the story elements?

Procedural Activities

- 1. Discuss beginning, middle, end of a story. Illustrate with a line on the board by labeling what has happened in their day at the beginning, the middle, and the end.
- 2. Read the story to the class. Discuss illustrations and what they see that fits with the story.
- 3. Ask them to retell the story to a partner
- 4. Discuss the beginning, middle, and end as a group
- 5. Students receive the story worksheet and work to draw in the events of the beginning, middle, and end of the story.

Materials Students Need: story element worksheet, pencil

Technology Utilized to Enhance Learning: the story can be printed in PDF format and used on paper, or the teacher may use a Smart Board or Active Board to pull up the story in Anyflip format.

Other Information

Modifications for special learners/ Enrichment Opportunities

For special learners, provide a copy of the story for children to see as they work on their worksheets.

For enrichment, have another dog story such as the *Spot* books, and let the children compare and contrast the two texts.
