Dog tags are one essential item that will be given to the mushers at the pre-race banquet. Each team will receive a set of dog tags. One side of the tag has a Roman Numeral on to indicate the race year. The flip side has a number and a letter. The number is the starting order number for the team. Each dog on the team is given a different letter. These letters are used to record information about each dog in the vet books that the mushers are required to carry. Race dog tags are one way to help ensure the safety of the Iditarod's canine athletes.

Sometimes dogs need to be removed from an Iditarod team. There could be many reasons for this to happen. They may get injured. Maybe they just do not want to run anymore. Maybe the musher has a strategic reason for releasing a dog.

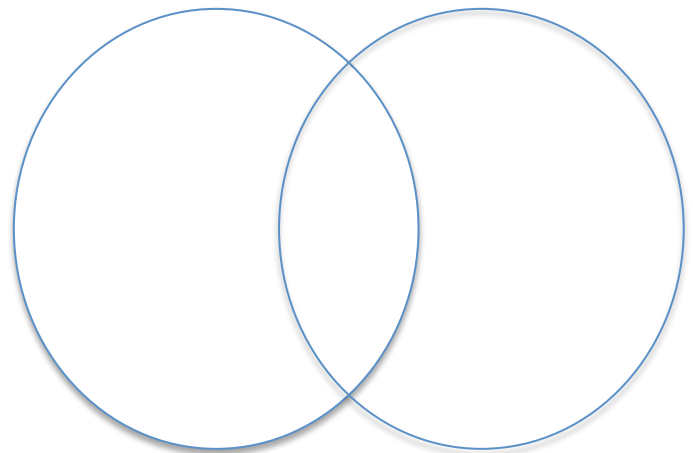
